

A MOTHER'S GIFT A Birth Tissue Donation Story

Before Emily Paris was pregnant with her first child, she'd never heard of donating birth tissue, also called placenta tissue. In a conversation with a neighbor who worked for Dakota Lions Sight & Health, she learned that donating her placenta could help dozens of people — at no risk to her or her baby. She was immediately interested in hearing more.

One Donation Helps up to 75 People.

The more Emily learned about donating her birth tissue, the fact that stuck out to her most was that one placenta can help up to 75 people. When transferred, birth tissue becomes the support structure for new cell growth anywhere in or on the body. Its adaptability enables it to be used in a wide range of patient treatments such as healing traumatic burns or skin infections, protecting nerves during surgery, treating dry eye, and more.

After learning how many people she could help, the decision to donate was simple. Emily's baby girl was breech, so as she planned for a C-Section delivery, she told her husband she wanted to donate her placenta as part of her birth plan.

"Donating your birth tissue helps so many people at no risk to you or your baby," Emily said. "It's really an amazing thing to do if you aren't planning to keep your placenta. Knowing how many individual people one donation helps is really motivating. If we have a second child, I would plan to donate again."



How the Donation Process Works.

While Emily knew she wanted to donate ahead of time, many expecting mothers aren't aware of the ability to donate. Most of our partner hospitals have on-site coordinators who meet with mothers when they arrive at the hospital to give birth to present the option of participating in our Birth Tissue Donation Program. The paperwork and medical questionnaire take no more than 20 minutes.

"The Dakota Lions Sight & Health team was kind and speedy during the process," Emily said. "They made it so easy to donate, which I appreciated."

Birth tissue is collected without disruption to birthing or post-birth and brings no risk to the mother or baby. Keeping the full focus of birth on the mom and baby will always be the priority.
